	Who are the members of your board and how are they involved in the organization?
	Describe the diversity and inclusion practice within your organization.
	What are your short-term (I-5 years) and long- term, (5-25) organizational goals? How do you plan to achieve them?
	Can you describe the project for which you are seeking funding?
	Can you provide a brief overview of your organization's mission and history?
	How does this project align with your organizations' overall mission and goals?

	How does your team's experience and expertise support the project's goals?
	How will additional funding affect the project's scope or outcomes?
ABOUT YOUR FINANCES	How do you make sure your nonprofit stays financially stable, avoids deficits, and can continue fulfilling its mission?
	What does sustainability mean to your organization, and how do you plan to maintain financial sustainability?
	How do you track and manage budget line items?
	Financial audits, financial controls and processes, financial issues the funder should be aware of such as a deficit.
PROGRAM BENEFICIARIES	Can you describe the primary population served through this request? Include data!
	How do you consult with and involve the community in your program?

	What method do you use to recruit and retain participant?
	How is participant feedback incorporated into your program development and continuation?

	What measurement and evaluation practice do you have in place?
	How do you ensure that your programs are effectively achieving their intended outcomes?
	What processes do you have in place for adapting programs based on evaluation findings or changing needs?
FAQ	What are grant funders typically looking for in a proposal?  Grant funders generally look for proposals that align with their mission and
	goals. They expect clear objectives, measurable outcomes, and a well-defined budget. Demonstrating organizational capacity

and past successes can also
strengthen your proposal.
How can I identify the right grant funder for my project?
Identifying the right grant funder involves researching funders whose
priorities match your project goals. Look into their past funding history,
eligibility criteria, and specific areas of interest to ensure alignment.
